


CG Active Duty by CY per 100K






CG Suicide Prevention Program Goals

 - 3. Limit on Command Access to Mental Healthcare Info**
 - 4. Notification and Hand-off in Criminal Investigations**
 - 5. Postvention**
 - 6. Reporting**
 - 7. Training**

- **Difficulty monitoring MH care in “white” spaces**
- **Limited MH Surveillance – Reserves & AD**
- **No Reintegration Program**
- **Impact of MH Diagnoses on Careers**
- **No Resilience-Building Skill Training available**
- **No Personal Financial Management Program**
- **Limited Outreach/Programs for Family Members**
- **No required trainings other than All-Hands**
