c. Describe the purpose of this DoD information system or electronic collection and describe the types of personal information about individuals collected in the system.

Special Needs Program Management Information System (SNPMIS) provides access to a comprehensive program of therapy, medical support, and social services for young TRICARE beneficiaries with special needs. SNPMIS is the Defense Health Agency (DHA) automated information system designed to ensure the Department of Defense (DoD) meets the unique information requirements associated with implementation of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

SNPMIS captures referral, evaluation, eligibility, and service plan data for children with special needs who are eligible for early intervention and special education services under IDEA. Management reports provide historical analysis to monitor ongoing improvements in quality of care initiatives. It also allows program managers to identify areas where additional services are needed. At the service level, activities of different programs can be compared to determine best practices that can be implemented throughout the Educational and Developmental Intervention Services (EDIS) clinics. SNPMIS is a workflow (subscribing system) hosted on the Healthcare Artifact and Imaging Management Solution (HAIMS) OpenText platform.

Categories of personally identifiable information (PII) and protected health information (PHI) collected by SNPMIS include personal descriptors, contact information, medical information, and educational program information. Records contained in the system may be retrieved by name or other unique identifier. This system is a distributed data collection application with database servers distributed at various Military Health System Application Access Gateways (MAAGs) located within the Continental United States (CONUS) and Outside the Continental United States (OCONUS). SNPMIS is currently used in 43 EDIS clinics at Army, Navy, and Air Force installations worldwide.

Categories of individuals from whom SNPMIS collects PII and PHI include children of members of the Armed Forces and civilians (i.e. authorized DoD Beneficiaries) who are entitled to receive early intervention and special education services from the DoD under the IDEA.

SNIPMIS is owned and managed by the Clinical Support Program Management Office (CSPMO)/Solution Delivery Division (SDD)/ Program Executive Office (PEO) Medical Systems (J-6)/DHA

SNPMIS collects PII to identify young beneficiaries' educational strengths and needs across DoD. The intended use of this PII is to monitor the developmental and educational services provided by EDIS to ensure program compliance and quality, and ensure that the DoD meets the unique information requirements associated with the implementation of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Per DHA Information Management Control Officer (IMCO), SNPMIS does not require an OMB Control Number as the system is not the point of entry for information collections.
