The Automated Information Discovery Environment Medical Common Operating Picture (AIDE MedCOP) is an enterprise level platform that leverages open standards and open source resources to provide a data processing pipeline that analyzes and combines information from government and commercial data sources. It includes tools for normalizing that data and permitting the identification of entities (e.g., organizations, addresses, phone numbers, etc.) within that data. It aggregates information from multiple sources to present a unified representation of an entity across all configured data sources. Users can then examine data about an entity, identify concepts that link data both within a data source and between sources, and save their analysis in workbooks that can be shared with other users as needed. AIDE MedCOP is a Information Technology (IT) web-based application accessed via personal computer (PC) based web browser application (e.g., Internet Explorer, Firefox, etc.) residing on Cloud One (C1) GovCloud. AIDE MedCOP provides both Medical Command and Control (C2) Common Operating Picture (COP).

AIDE MedCOP collects information from both members of the general public and Federal employees (Military Members, DoD civilians, Non-DoD civilians, and Foreign Nations). The personally identifiable information/ protected health information (PII/PHI) collected includes: demographic information, employment information and medical information.

AIDE MedCOP is owned by DHA and operated by Defense Healthcare Management Systems (DHMS).

PII/PHI is collected to determine eligibility and administer health care delivery services. The intended use of PII/PHI is for patient identification, verification, and to ensure that historical records for patient treatment are available, match, and are accurate.
