Dear Mr. Chairman:

This report responds to a request in the House Conference Report 108-622 to provide a quarterly report to the defense committees on the status of third-party collections.

Cumulative performance through the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Fiscal Year 2005 is running slightly below the same period during Fiscal Year 2004 (8% lower). The Department's 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter report for Fiscal Year 2005, dated July 12, 2005, noted that Fiscal Year 2005 performance for the Third Party Collections Program (TPCP) was running slightly below Fiscal Year 2004 collections (7% lower).

Part of the decrease can be attributed to a reduction in non-active duty workload in military treatment facilities (MTFs) when compared to Fiscal Year 2004. As an example, Air Force non-active duty inpatient dispositions through the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Fiscal Year 2005 are down 11.2% compared to the same period in Fiscal year 2004. Similarly, Air Force outpatient encounters are down 5.7% through the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Fiscal Year 2005 compared to the same period in Fiscal Year 2004.
