Dear Mr. Chairman:

This report responds to a request in the House Conference Report 108-622 to provide a quarterly report to the defense committees on the status of third-party collections.

Cumulative performance through the third quarter Fiscal Year (FY) 2005 is running 5.1 percent below the same period during FY 2004. The Department's second quarter report for FY 2005, dated October 21, 2005, noted that FY 2005 performance for the Third Party Collections Program (TPCP) was running 8.0 percent below FY 2004 collections.

Part of the decrease can be attributed to a reduction in non-active duty workload in military treatment facilities when compared to FY 2004. As an example, Air Force non-active duty inpatient dispositions through the third quarter FY 2005 are down 10.8 percent, compared to the same period in FY 2004. Overall, Military Health System (MHS) non-active duty inpatient dispositions are down 2.6 percent. Similarly, Air Force outpatient encounters are down 4.4 percent through the third quarter FY 2005 compared to the same period in FY 2004, while MHS encounters overall are down 3.0 percent.
