Dear Mr. Chairman:

The enclosed semiannual report provides the current status of the Department of Defense Enhanced Access to Autism Services Demonstration, as requested by page 671 of the Joint Explanatory Statement, accompanying the Duncan Hunter National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year (FY) 2009. Specifically, this report includes: 1) the number of autistic children served, 2) the type and frequency of services provided, 3) the number of available providers by region, and 4) whether reimbursement levels are sufficient to retain qualified providers in TRICARE networks. The report also includes demonstration cost information for FY 2012.

Current results indicate participation by beneficiaries and partners continues to increase. We believe these increases reflect conditions where reimbursement rates are acceptable to providers. This is allowing for increased capacity to meet the needs of enrolled TRICARE beneficiaries.

While this report specifically discusses the Autism Services Demonstration, the Department is actively implementing coverage of Applied Behavior Analysis as a TRICARE Basic Program medical benefit in compliance with a July 26, 2012, federal court order in *Berge v. United States*. TRICARE has been processing claims for additional services authorized under the Basic Program and will continue to process claims for additional services authorized under the Autism Services Demonstration pending outcome of ongoing litigation.

Similar letters are being sent to the Chairpersons of the other congressional defense committees. Thank you for your interest in the health and well-being of our Service members, veterans, and their families.

STATUS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE ENHANCED ACCESS TO AUTISM SERVICES DEMONSTRATION

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This semiannual report is in response to explanatory material to section 732 in the Joint Explanatory Statement to accompany S. 3001, the Duncan Hunter National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2009. The Joint Explanatory Statement requested the Secretary provide an initial report to Congress not later than 90 days after the enactment of S. 3001 and semiannually thereafter on the status of implementation of the TRICARE demonstration.

INTRODUCTION

In response to section 717 of the John Warner NDAA for FY 2007, the Department of Defense implemented the Enhanced Access to Autism Services Demonstration ("Demonstration") on March 15, 2008. This project tests the feasibility of expanding the pool of providers of autism treatment services to include those not meeting the strict guidelines of the current departmental regulations.

To increase access and test the advisability and feasibility of authorizing TRICARE reimbursement for Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) services delivered by non-professional providers, the Department developed and implemented the Enhanced Access to Autism Services Demonstration. The key feature of the Demonstration is providing Educational Interventions for Autism Spectrum Disorders (EIA) by a two-tiered delivery model:

- Individuals certified by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board (BACB) at the Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) or BACB Certified Assistant Behavior Analyst (BCaBA) level as "supervisors" who have a contractual relationship with TRICARE, either individually or as an employee of a TRICARE-authorized provider; and
- Non-certified individuals, for example, "Tutors", as the "hands-on" providers of ABA under the supervision of a BCBA or BCaBA.

The Demonstration was initially implemented on March 15, 2008. Administrative requirements of the Demonstration were substantially revised and implemented on September 10, 2008. In addition, section 732 of the NDAA for FY 2009 increased the limit of government maximum requirement for certain benefits, including Special Education, from \$2,500 per month to \$36,000 per year. That change was implemented on April 1, 2009.

RESULTS

The following information for the period April 1, 2012, through September 30, 2012, is based on contractors' reports and claims processed under the Demonstration.

CONCLUSION

As evidenced in our previous reports and the above information, participation by beneficiaries and providers continues to increase steadily. We believe these increases reflect that reimbursement rates are acceptable to providers and this is allowing for increased capacity to meet the needs of enrolled TRICARE beneficiaries.
