The Department's response to the Joint Explanatory Statement, page 998, accompanying H.R. 1625, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2018 (Public Law 115–141), is enclosed. The report provides a quarterly update on the progress of all hospital construction projects, including any settlements reached for contractor error or project management deficiencies, for the first quarter of Fiscal Year (FY) 2022.

The Defense Health Agency and its construction agents, the United States Army Corps of Engineers and Naval Facilities Engineering Command, continue to execute the military construction of military medical facilities. As of the first quarter of FY 2022, two new clinics have commenced construction activities. The enclosed report on the progress of military medical construction projects provides construction timelines and current working estimates of active hospital and clinic construction projects for the first quarter of FY 2022.

DEFENSE HEALTH AGENCY'S HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM STATUS OF HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The first quarter report for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 is provided in response to the Joint Explanatory Statement, page 998, accompanying H.R. 1625, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2018 (Public Law 115–141), requesting the status of all hospital construction projects. The data presented below, as reported by design and construction agents, reflects data submitted through December 15, 2021, representing the first quarter of FY 2022. As of the submission of this report, there are 22 active hospital and clinic projects in construction, 15 projects in the design phase, and no contractor errors or project management deficiencies have been identified.

BACKGROUND

The Defense Health Agency is responsible for facility life-cycle management of U.S. military medical facilities worldwide, to preserve ready and resilient facilities that sustain military medicine's mission assurance of world-class health care for America's warfighters and their families. These military medical facilities include medical centers, hospitals, clinics, ambulatory care centers, medical training facilities, medical research facilities, and veterinary facilities in the Military Health System. In accordance with 10 U.S.C. § 2851 and Department of Defense Directive 4270.5, "Military Construction," military construction of such facilities is to be carried out under the direction and supervision of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers or Naval Facilities Engineering Command, as the design and construction agents for the current active projects identified in this report. Therefore, data herein corresponds with that provided by the design and construction agents.

RESULTS

Current Status of Active Construction Projects

Active hospital and clinic projects in construction identified in this report include those awarded through projects that reached substantial completion and are in transition. The status, including a construction timeline and current working estimate of the active hospital and clinic projects in construction is included in Table 1, representing the first quarter of FY 2022. Other projects include projects that are complete and waiting for financial closeout by the construction agents.

As of December 15, 2021, two new clinic projects commenced construction activities and no contractor errors or project management deficiencies have been identified. The data presented above delineates status, construction timeline, and the current working estimate of the active construction projects. It reflects updated data provided by the design and construction agents of each respective project and was additionally submitted with the 10 U.S.C. § 2851 report compiled by Defense Health Agency in December 2021. This data will be appropriately updated in future quarterly reports.
